Cape Charles Rosenwald School Renovation Initiative

The Cape Charles Rosenwald School Restoration Initiative (CCRSRI) is a collection of alumni, civic and religious leaders, business owners, and others who recognize the importance of the former Cape Charles Elementary School. Since CCRSRI's founding in 2009, they have raised over \$800 thousand dollars toward the school's purchase and restoration. There is just one item left to fully fund on a list of projects in Phase 1: \$50,000 towards a new roof.

Built in 1927, Cape Charles Elementary, was one of over 5000 schools known as a "Rosenwald School" in honor of Julius Rosenwald, the philanthropist and president of Sears Roebuck who joined with the Black educator and leader Booker T. Washington to build the schools for African-American children throughout the South during the long period of segregation known as Jim Crow.

Incorporating state-of-the-art elements of school design, the brick school had four class-rooms, an auditorium and office and was staffed by 3 teachers and a principal/teacher. It taught children in grades 1-7 and served as an important part of local African-American life for many years.

The school closed in 1966, and the property was converted to a seafood processing plant that closed in 1977. The building sat vacant for 42 years. Despite neglect, the building maintains a great deal of its historic integrity. CCRSRI purchased the building in January 2019.

Other Rosenwald Schools were also abandoned following integration, their history mostly forgotten. Few remain and even fewer have been restored. In 2002 the National Trust for Historic Preservation named Rosenwald Schools among our nation's "most endangered places." Of the 382 schools and school-related buildings built in Virginia, 256 (67%) have been demolished and only 126 (33%) are still standing.

CCRSRI is committed to preserving the school to contribute to the historical appeal of Cape Charles and provide a new resource for the entire community.

In 2021, the Foundation was pleased to provide \$50,000 in grant funds to assist in the replacement of a roof for this historic asset.

Childrens' Harbor

Childrens' Harbor is a comprehensive early childhood agency operating in the South Hampton Roads area since 1911. The Board of Directors recognized the need to expand its service area to the Eastern Shore of Virginia, understanding that there is a huge need for adequate childcare and educational services in both Accomack and Northampton Counties.

In 1923, the corporation, a §501(c) (3) agency, became a certified member of the United Way of South Hampton Roads (UWSHR). From its modest beginnings as one small childcare facility, the parent agency has grown to currently operate four model early care and education centers; a USDA Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP); and a Community Training and Professional Development Program. Moreover, Children's Harbor provides an Emergency Voucher Fund providing monetary assistance to maintain stability for children in early care and education (ECE) settings for families experiencing a crisis, and Infant Toddler Specialists who ensure our region's most vulnerable children are reaching developmental milestones.



Children's Harbor's tuition is on a sliding scale based on total family income, accepting both Virginia Department of Social Services subsidies, and NAACCRA/GSA subsides from military service members.

Children's Harbor assists families that are at risk, unemployed, dual income and low income earners, parents/guardians with children ages 6 weeks to 12 years of age and remains committed to providing affordable access to high quality child care and early education. This ensures children enter kindergarten ready to learn by providing them with the foundation for future success in school, life, and work. Surveys done locally indicated a need for additional affordable childcare facilities on the Shore. Children's Harbor located and purchased property in Tasley to create a new center that opened in April of 2022. The Foundation supported the project through a grant for \$50,000 to purchase and install new playground equipment.

Smart Beginnings

In 2011, the Northampton County Education Foundation (NCEF), with funding from PNC Bank, sponsored an Eastern Shore Forum on early childhood care and education, identifying this area as a critical need for Eastern Shore families. Following the Forum, a planning group of community leaders formed the Eastern Shore Early Childhood Coalition (ESECC) to discuss the ideas explored and create an ongoing group to build on these ideas. In 2013, this group became affiliated with the Virginia Early Childhood Foundation (VECF), the non-profit parent organization of Smart Beginnings organizations across the Commonwealth. With this affiliation, the ESECC became Smart Beginnings Eastern Shore (SBES).



VISION

Through the support of diverse community partnerships, all Eastern Shore families have equal access to affordable, quality early childhood education, intervention services and resources that ensure young children are ready for school and build the foundation for success in school, work, and life.

MISSION

To improve access to quality early services that promote the health well-being and school readiness of all children (0 - 5) on the Eastern Shore through a collaborative-systems building approach with community partners.

SBES has pursued its Mission through several major Shore-wide events and initiatives:

The Kids Count On the Eastern Shore Forums, Go & Grow Starter Pack Initiative, and Everyday Fun With Reading Initiative.

Recently passed state legislation unified early care and education programs under the Virginia Department of Education and formed state Ready Regions to work with local partners for early childhood success. It also set forth several mandates, one of which required SBES to rebrand and recreate their website. The Community Foundation provided grant funds of \$43,400 to assist with this work along with an additional \$6,600 for the Go And Grow Starter Pack program.

Joyce Brown Milliner Endowment

Mrs. Milliner recently willed a legacy gift to the Eastern Shore of Virginia Public Library Foundation which was named the Joyce Brown Milliner Endowment.

Born in Covington, VA, she was the daughter of the late Larry H. Brown and Bernice Willis Brown. She was a graduate of Goldey-Beacom Business School of Wilmington, DE. In 1955, Mrs. Milliner became one of the first women hired by NACA (Wallops Flight Center). Over the next 37 years, she served as the facility's Public Affairs Officer, retiring in 1992 from NASA Wallops Flight Facility. She was the wife of the late Rev. Wilber Jackson "Jack" Milliner, Jr. and a resident of Burton Shore Road since age 10.

An avid sewer and crafter, Mrs. Milliner enjoyed sharing her talents with others, particularly within the organizations she was involved. In addition to volunteering at Shore LifeCare Nursing and Rehabilitation Center, she was a longtime member and past president of the Riverside Shore Memorial Hospital Auxiliary, member of the Red Hat Society, The Soroptimist Club of Accomack County, the Shore Can Sewing Guild, and Melfa United Methodist Church.

Mrs. Milliner's generous gift to the Library ensures that countless generations of Eastern Shore residents will continue to have access to our regional libraries and is an example of how planned giving can truly make a difference in your community forever.

ESVCF Funds

DONOR ADVISED FUNDS

Donor advisors can contribute assets at any time and then recommend grants to nonprofit organizations from the advised funds they have established.

FIELD OF INTEREST FUNDS

Donors are able to address an area of concern, such as arts andx culture, education, the environment or human services. These funds allow the Foundation's Board to choose specific nonprofit organizations as grant recipients who meet a donor's criteria.

UNRESTRICTED FUNDS

These funds support responsive and strategic grants and broad, evolving community needs. The use of these funds are left to the discretion of the Foundation's Board of Directors, which regularly reviews proposals from area nonprofit organizations.

SCHOLARSHIP FUNDS

These funds provide students with financial resources for college and other educational opportunities. Donors can establish criteria for the scholarship.

DESIGNATED FUNDS

Donors are able to select specific nonprofit organizations to receive support as long as the organizations remain in existence and continue their charitable purposes.

ORGANIZATIONAL FUNDS

These funds are established by nonprofit organizations to generate income for their own use. The funds listed here, totaling \$15,770,694 as of December 31, 2021, comprise the entirety of the capital assets of ESVCF. Fund assets are managed by the Hampton Roads Community Foundation. The HRCF makes 4.5% of the fund's trailing 12-quarter average balance available to meet each funds' charitable purposes annually.

Your legacy of generosity, forever

Call them what you want: bequests, trusts, wills, estates, or charitable giving instruments. All are tools to continue or establish your legacy of caring, forever. And, planned giving enables philanthropic individuals to make larger gifts to charitable organizations than they could generally make from ordinary income.

Some planned gifts provide life-long income to a donor. Other gift plans use estate and tax planning

to provide for charity and heirs in ways that maximize the gift and/or minimize its impact on the donor's estate.

Thus, by definition, a planned gift is any major gift, made in lifetime or at death as part of a donor's overall financial and/or estate planning. These include gifts of equity, life insurance, real estate, personal property, or cash.

By contrast, gifts to the annual fund or for membership dues are made from a donor's discretionary income, and while they may be budgeted for, they are not planned.

Whether a donor uses cash, appreciated securities/stock, real estate, artwork, partnership interests, personal property, life insurance, a retirement plan, etc., the benefits of funding a planned gift can make this type of charitable giving very attractive to both donor and charity.

What Are the Three Types of Planned Gifts?

- 1) outright gifts that use appreciated assets as a substitute for cash;
- 2) gifts that return income or other financial benefits to the donor in return for the contribution;
- 3) gifts payable upon the donor's death.

What Gift Plans Pay Income for Life to Donors?

Charitable gift annuities make fixed payments, starting either when the gift is made (an immediate-payment gift annuity) or at a later date (a deferred or flexible gift annuity). Some organizations maintain pooled income funds, which commingle donations, pay beneficiaries variable depending on the earnings of the fund, and generally operate like a charitable mutual fund. Charitable remainder unitrusts and annuity trusts are individually managed trusts that pay the beneficiaries either a fixed percentage of trust income or a fixed dollar amount.

What Might be some of the Tax Benefits of Planned Gifts?

Donors can contribute appreciated property, like securities or real estate, receive a charitable deduction for the full market value of the asset, and pay no capital gains tax on the transfer.

Donors who establish a life-income gift receive a tax deduction for the full, fair market value of the assets contributed, minus the present value of the income interest retained; if they fund their gift with appreciated property they pay no upfront capital gains tax on the transfer.

Gifts payable to charity upon the donor's death, like a bequest or a beneficiary designation in a life insurance policy or retirement account, do not generate a lifetime income tax deduction for the donor, but they are exempt from estate tax.




Hampton Roads Community Foundation

Through its investment committee, which has investment oversight responsibility for an endowment of approximately \$535 million, the Hampton Roads Community Foundation seeks to invest resources prudently in order to preserve and grow the endowment's capacity to fund grants in accordance with donors' wishes today and in the future.

The Hampton Roads Community Foundation is committed to being a good steward of the assets entrusted to it by generous donors over the past 68 years. HRCF invests its resources wisely so they grow to meet future needs while providing funds for grants and scholarships today.

Oversight of HRCF investment portfolio is handled by its investment committee, which works with its investment manager, Spider Management Company LLC of Richmond. Since 2011 the community foundation began investing with Spider Management through its Richmond Fund. The Hampton Roads Community Foundation joins University of Richmond and other nonprofit endowments as Spider Management partners.



Spider manages approximately \$4.1 billion in assets and provides us access to a mature, well-diversified investment portfolio managed by a professional staff with an excellent performance record. It also gives a snapshot of the portfolio's asset allocation as of December 31, 2021.
