DEDICATED VOLUNTEERS HELPING NEIGHBORS

In our prior annual report, we featured the important work of the Shore Delivery Corps (SDC) and how it self-formed in response to the risks posed by Covid-19. During the period from July 2020 through June 2021, SDC continued to work diligently to ensure that Eastern Shore residents stayed safe from the threats to our community.

The mission of the SDC is to provide free delivery service of needed medical supplies and prescriptions as well as perishable and non-perishable groceries to our fellow Eastern Shore of Virginia citizens who are at the highest risk for serious complications from COVID-19, thus allowing this population to stay at home, away from public places and decreasing the potential exposure and spread of this virus.

During this time period, SDC volunteers received over 800 calls and made 832 deliveries of groceries, prescriptions, Food Bank deliveries, deliveries to public schools as well as assisting the Eastern Shore Action Agency on Aging/Community Action Agency with deliveries. In addition, SDC volunteers also provided 411 deliveries of bulk paper and 158 deliveries to local schools.

Indeed, their hard work did not go unrecognized, particularly by United Way at a national and regional levels. The United Way highlighted the efforts to keep our community safe in two feature articles and the work of SDC garnered several local newspaper articles as well as radio coverage from WESR.

In addition, the SDC was granted funds from Accomack County to assist in their important work. The funds were part of emergency Covid-19 received from the state and national agencies.

HOW IT WORKS:

An older person or someone with a pre-existing health condition who is interested in having their groceries delivered places a call to SDC.

A volunteer in the remote Call Center answers the phone. The volunteer explains Shore Delivery Corps to the client, verifies their eligibility as "high-risk," and asks a few intake questions like their address and delivery date. They also find out whether the person can pay or needs free food assistance.

The Call Center volunteer lists the participating grocery stores and pharmacies that clients can order from for an SDC delivery.

The Call Center volunteer notifies a dispatch volunteer of the impending delivery and Dispatch readies a volunteer to make the delivery.

The client makes a phone call to their preferred grocery store or pharmacy and gives them their order.

The store employee takes their order and payment information over the phone.

The store prepares the order for the customer and processes the payment.

Dispatch sends a Shore Delivery Corps volunteer to retrieve the groceries and deliver them to the client's home.

"Working together, we can all make a difference in preserving the lives and good health of our fellow citizens who are at the greatest risk of serious complications from COVID-19," said Corps leader Jeff Holland.

Historic Onancock School Community & Cultural Center is a 13-acre oasis in the heart of Onancock, Virginia. The Onancock School property has been educating children on the Eastern Shore for over 150 years. The present building, now 99 years old, is in the midst of rehabilitation for re-use as a community and cultural center to benefit all residents and visitors to the Eastern Shore.

The property first opened in 1859 as the Atlantic Female Institution, a college for young women and over time was known as the Onancock Academy and subsequently the Margaret Academy until 1922 when Onancock High School was dedicated. The last class to graduate from OHS was in 1984 and in 2006, Accomack County returned the building to the Town of Onancock when local citizens self-formed and created Friends of Onancock School. Their mission is to preserve and revitalize the property as public open space to benefit all residents of the Eastern Shore. In 2022, the organization will celebrate the centennial of their dedication as Onancock High School.

One of the many challenges of re-purposing a building such as Onancock School lay in making the facility fully accessible to the entire community, particularly physical access to the structure. To that end, the school applied for and was granted \$50,000 to assist with the installation of an elevator in the building. This added feature will not only make the building more accessible, doing so makes the organization eligible for other types of grants and funding and thus makes a Shore treasure even more valuable.

Previous to the onset of the pandemic in 2020, Historic Onancock School served our diverse community and visitors with a variety of program options from personal fitness and self-defense classes, a table tennis club for all skill levels, and being a member of the Accomac CommUnity Band. In addition, the Waterman's Heritage Museum is a must-see destination that celebrates the rich maritime heritage of the Eastern Shore watermen.

Phase 1, the largest stage of their outdoor upgrades opened recently and was tested and approved by hundreds of happy campers. The shade of the canopy and large trees are also providing a needed respite from the summer sun.

Both the Artisans Guild of the Eastern Shore and the Eastern Shore Art League have their homes within the school.

THE DAVIS CENTER

FOSTERING CREATIVITY AND INTERACTION FOR ALL

There was a time many generations ago that Whitesville served as a central location that African Americans relied on for services and entertainment. The community included a school-house (historic Rosenthal School), a movie theater, a grocery store, a hotel, a restaurant, and a dance hall. During this time, business owners were respected families who served as de facto community leaders.

Over many years, the businesses began to close, families moved out of the area, and the community entered a period of degradation. The visionaries of the Davis Center are heirs of this community and seek to honor the legacy of Whitesville. The Community Foundation provided a \$50,000 grant to the Davis Center to renovate and restore an historic property to be used as the a community center and the focal point of their activities.

While our community is long on space, land, and opportunities, the project visionaries, who are offspring of an Eastern Shore upbringing, can attest that what the area is shortest on are programs and activities for the youth to grow and develop. For decades rural Eastern Shore of Virginia communities have been absent an environment that encourages youth to grow beyond their circumstance, a place for adults to come together for social programs, and an opportunity for creatives to create, display, and market their talents.

The Davis Center seeks to fill these gaps by providing multi-purpose spaces where the community can safely and creatively enjoy programming and services intended to benefit the health and well-being of the community at large. This project will address limited availability of recreational outlets faced by youth and adults in the Accomack County region of the Eastern Shore of Virginia. The Davis Center will serve as a community collective, entrepreneurial hub, creative workspace, youth enrichment resource, and technology center.

Their goals are to provide the opportunity for an individual or family to become more self-sufficient and less dependent on subsidized support, mobilize community resources to improve the lives of low-income people and the communities in which they live, and enable communities to be more responsive to the needs of low-income persons, and to establish realistic, attainable objectives expressed in concrete terms which permit the measuring of results.

CHINCOTEAGUE ISLAND ARTS ORGANIZATION ISLAND THEATRE AND THEATRE ANNEX

CIAO started in 2011 as concerned residents saw the island's historic 1946 movie theater face the possibility of demolition after falling into disrepair. In the 1940s and '50s, it was the town's place to go for everything, movies, live shows, meetings, community events said Board Chair Bill Borges. The group purchased the theater before it could be sold for redevelopment and completely restored the building. "CIAO brought it back to its prominence in the downtown," he said. CIAO ensured continued access to films and professional performing arts for its residents and island visitors.

The theater and the town's history is also tied to a famous literary pony. In 1947, Marguerite Henry wrote "Misty of Chincoteague." The beloved children's book series features the wild ponies of Assateague Island, situated across a narrow inlet from Chincoteague. The movie "Misty" based on the book premiered there in 1961. Misty's hoof prints are set in concrete on the sidewalk in front of the Island Theater.

The real-life horse which inspired the book are just one reason people visit. Tourists flock to the Virginia barrier island for its climate, the horses, the surrounding nature preserves and pristine beaches, its famed Chincoteague oysters, and its birding opportunities, according to Borges. Chincoteague has over one million visitors annually who come to experience the unique atmosphere of island life.

Fewer than 3,500 people live on the island year-round, he said. Like many small communities, the movie theater is a linchpin for its downtown, drawing in locals and tourists alike. During the off-season, it is a place for locals to congregate as a community. During the summer, it offers visiting families an additional venue where they can share a vacation experience.

While the historic theater offers new movies on the weekend, it is open nearly every day for the community. Much like the 1940s when it first opened, they offer live theater, classic films, music, events for senior residents, families and children.

When CIAO bought the building, it had been in sad shape for many years. "It is sometimes a challenge to keep a nearly 80-year-old building in good repair," Bill Borges, related. All of their events were put on hold for more than a year during the pandemic and have just started coming back. A grant from the Community Foundation in 2019 assisted with the renovation by providing funds to upgrade the theatre's heating and air conditioning systems.

ESVCF maintains an ongoing program of creating Organizational Funds for local nonprofit organizations. These relationships allow for management of dedicated endowments by the Hampton Roads Community Foundation through ESVCF while generating an annual income for the nonprofit. The Eastern Shore Community College Foundation created the first Organizational Fund with ESVCF in 2006. Since then, many additional partner groups have created endowments. ESVCF looks forward to assisting additional partner groups in the years ahead through this growing program.

ESVCF Funds

Financials

Donor Advised Funds

Donor advisors can contribute assets at any time and then recommend grants to nonprofit organizations from the advised funds they have established.

Field of Interest Funds

Donors are able to address an area of concern, such as arts andx culture, education, the environment or human services. These funds allow the Foundation's Board to choose specific nonprofit organizations as grant recipients who meet a donor's criteria.

Unrestricted Funds

These funds support responsive and strategic grants and broad, evolving community needs. The use of these funds are left to the discretion of the Foundation's Board of Directors, which regularly reviews proposals from area nonprofit organizations.

Scholarship Funds

These funds provide students with financial resources for college and other educational opportunities. Donors can establish criteria for the scholarship.

Designated Funds

Donors are able to select specific nonprofit organizations to receive support as long as the organizations remain in existence and continue their charitable purposes.

Organizational Funds

These funds are established by nonprofit organizations to generate income for their own use. The funds listed here, totaling \$12,918,792.00 as of December 31, 2020, comprise the entirety of the capital assets of ESVCF. Fund assets are managed by the Hampton Roads Community Foundation. The HRCF makes 4.5% of the fund's trailing 12-quarter average balance available to meet each funds' charitable purposes annually.

The affiliate relationship between the Eastern Shore of Virginia Community Foundation and the Hampton Roads Community Foundation (HRCF) places stewardship of ESVCF capital assets with the Hampton Roads Community Foundation. Through its investment committee, which has investment oversight responsibility for an endowment of approximately \$355 million, the Hampton Roads Community Foundation seeks to invest resources prudently in order to preserve and grow the endowment's capacity to fund grants in accordance with donors' wishes today and in the future.

The Hampton Roads Community Foundation is committed to being a good steward of the assets entrusted to it by generous donors over the past 68 years. HRCF invests its resources wisely so they grow to meet future needs while providing funds for grants and scholarships today.

Oversight of HRCF investment portfolio is handled by its investment committee, which works with its investment manager, Spider Management Company LLC of Richmond. Since 2011 the community foundation began investing with Spider Management through its Richmond Fund. The Hampton Roads Community Foundation joins University of Richmond and other nonprofit endowments as Spider Management partners.

Spider manages approximately \$4.1 billion in assets and provides us access to a mature, well-diversified investment portfolio managed by a professional staff with an excellent performance record.

It also gives a snapshot of the portfolio's asset allocation as of December 31, 2019.
